In early 2022, we began working on a project that will see us open a new building in downtown Red Deer: The Centre for Social Impact. This centre will be a place where charities and nonprofit organizations can collaborate, share resources, and minimize their operating costs. This shared centre will provide people with easy access to a variety of supports and services. The Professional Building, located on Ross Street, will become the Centre for Social Impact for the purpose of supporting charities and non-profits in 2023.





OUR IMPACT

Gwen came to the 49th Street Youth Shelter in 2021 and has been involved with Youth HQ ever since. Gwen stayed at the Shelter for awhile, receiving help from a social worker, and would soon find her own home thanks in part to the support and encouragement she received from the shelter staff. When her grades were not as high as she wanted, she joined Raise the Grade. The BGC team, the other participants, and the Raise the Grade program curriculums helped her improve her grades and begin to excel in school. They also helped her learn about managing her living expenses while providing emotional support and a place in which she could always feel welcome. Gwen was even selected to represent BGC of Red Deer & District at the BGC National Youth Conference in 2023, an easy decision for the BGC team to make. When she first joined our programs, Gwen was very anxious, reserved, and shy. Since then, she has gained so much courage and become a fixture at the Youth HQ office, even going so far as to go around the office to ask our staff for pledges for our Wake-a-thon event and Mixing Spoon fundraiser. The positivity, confidence, and passion she has gained since joining our programs is something our entire team is both proud of and inspired by every day.

We plan to continue these programs and want to ensure that we are finding ways to include youth from all the communities we serve across Central Alberta in these beneficial programs.

The new Mentoring for Young Adults from Care Program seeks to match a caring mentor with young adults transitioning from Children's Services into independence. Support from our community allowed us to run successful events such as the Littles Build BIGGER event at KCB Cabinets & Renovations on August 27, which saw many of our waitlist kids get the chance to build and decorate their very own toolkit. This event doubled as a recruitment drive and fundraiser that saw various people from our community volunteer to get soaked in a dunk tank. The entire BBBS team offers a heartfelt thank you to everyone who helped make 2022 so special and cannot wait to see what 2023 will bring.

2022 saw a noticeable increase in the amount of youth served by the 49th Street Youth Shelter. 153 of the youth admitted to the shelter stated that they would live on the streets or have nowhere else to go were it not for the shelter. Thanks to the tireless efforts of the shelter staff and annual updates to help them better serve the community, the shelter never had to turn away a youth looking for support in 2022.
